



NOTICE ON ENVIRONMENTAL OVERSIGHT

1. Backdrop

Khushi Parisara has conducted exhaustive research into the escalating environmental degradation across the state. Its work has not only identified the root causes of these disasters but has provided actionable solutions designed to revert, minimize, and eventually eliminate such threats by the responsible governors.

Despite its efforts, it can be observed a systematic failure of environmental governance at different levels.

Our deep-dive assessments provided to the relevant departments, yet remain unreplied, unconsidered or unapplied.

Our petitions to higher authorities to acknowledge the urgency of the issues at stake, only met with bureaucratic silence.

Our delivered drafted policies and specific proposals for a roadmap of regenerative action have been consistently dismissed.

The current institutional stance seems to be of intentional avoidance as, by dismissing these solutions, the responsible bodies seem effectively indicating that either the problems are non-existent, they are deemed irrelevant, or they are perpetually someone else's responsibility.

We have depleted almost all avenues of civic participation. Henceforward, we seem to be maxed out. The responsibility for the impending environmental consequences rests now solely and squarely on the officers and dignitaries who choose inaction over intervention. 2. Environmental Responsibility

After meticulously cognized the environmental crises devastating Karnataka, remarkably at the coast, our work has moved beyond identifying problems to provide the specific solutions required to revert, minimize, and eliminate them.

Those solutions —ranging from policy drafts and strategic frameworks for coastal governance to waste management pilot projects —are publicly accessible and have been formally submitted to the relevant bodies.

The systemic failures in waste management, CRZ violations and marine pollution (among many others), well display the gap between institutional ineptitude and environmental necessity. Through inaction, the authorities have effectively adopted the stance that the problems do not exist, the problems exist but are irrelevant, the problems are always of the responsibility of another dignitary.

We have fulfilled our duty as citizens and eco-denizens providing blueprints for change. To feature the feats of the authorities and meeting a wall of indifference, just highlights the negligence of their duty. Thus, by ignoring the evidence of environmental disasters and their actionable solutions, the responsible bodies acknowledge full liability for the ongoing environmental ruin of the state. "Green Washing" and "Institutional Inertia" is currently becoming matters of public record.

3. Apex of the Institutional failure atop environmental ruins

THE MANDATE – As, under Article 48A of the Constitution, the State is mandated to protect and improve the environment, and under the Public Trust Doctrine, the government is the legal trustee of natural resources, to protect the environment isn't a favour to citizens —it is a legal duty.

THE RECORD OF PUBLIC SUBMISSION – by over 10 years of thorough research, action-oriented solutions/proposals, policy frameworks were submitted to address the environmental degradation, entreating remedial actions.

THE FAILURE – Despite that, the lack of political and administrative will of responsible bodies defaulted their duty through administrative silence, repeatedly failing to acknowledge or to act upon the proficient citizens' inputs, roadmaps and requests, regularly redirecting accountability to other dignitaries/departments to avoid action – with their deliberate negligence aggravating the ecological settings.

As of this date, we should cease all attempts to urge an administration that refuses to be urged.
